IRT Partnerships Begin with Communities

How do IRT partnerships between the military and communities work? How does the experience differ?

Through his work on the Pima County Roadway IRT mission over the past 2 years, Sergeant Michael Wood has gained a unique perspective—first with the U.S. Marine Corps (USMC) Reserve and now with the community partner: the Pima County Department of Transportation (DOT). As a USMC mechanic, his IRT

experience was invaluable: "I used everything I learned from IRT throughout my deployment." Not only did the mission activities supply unmatched training but the planning process offered valuable lessons for the deployment environment. "The planning process provides a huge amount of training."

When he joined the Pima County DOT, Sgt Wood learned the equal importance of the mission for community partners. The community receives continuous value as the Marines make repairs in the field while training on heavy equipment. "With Pima County, they get...tractors and...to say 'hey, let's go make something." When a community need corresponds with a military training requirement—as it does in Pima County—an IRT mission is born.

The application and planning process take time and effort. DOT staff go above and beyond, working nights and weekends to plan IRT activities, but that effort pays off. Pima County benefits from the hard work of the military and the participants receive training to prepare them for deployments. This brings intrinsic satisfaction and pride to everyone.
