# Mississippi's Toughest Kids Camp Kamassa—Year Four

The FY 2021 mission season is in full swing and shaping up to deliver military training value across 33 civil-military partnerships occurring in 22 states and territories. This month we highlight a recurring mission in its fourth year—IRT Camp Kamassa.

Led by the Air Force Reserve in partnership with the Mississippi's Toughest Kids Foundation (MTK), this year's joint mission began March 1 and is forecast to provide training to more than 1,400 Service Members including support units from the Army National Guard, Marine Corps Reserve, Navy Reserve, and Air National Guard.

Over the course of its history, the primary mission focus has been the construction of the 326-acre Camp Kamassa, located nine miles northwest of Crystal Springs,

Mississippi. Founded in 2008 by Mary Kitchens and her husband, Dan, MTK's mission is to "build and maintain the first and only year-round, fully handicap accessible camp facility in Mississippi to be used by children and adults with serious illnesses, physical and mental challenges, and other special needs."

This year's mission focus is centered around the construction of a recreation pavilion, eight duplex cabins, a maintenance barn, and additional sewage and water systems. Service Members will train in operations management, heavy equipment operation, electrical wiring, structural work, and utilities locating. These are only a snapshot of the entire body of work and outcomes this military training has, and continues to, deliver. We look forward to celebrating these accomplishments on June 24 as the Air Force Reserve and MTK Camp Kamassa host this year's Distinguished Visitor Day at the campgrounds.

Training will last until the scheduled August 21st mission completion date. Mission participants will continue to arrive in one of several 'rotations'; which can last anywhere from a few days to several weeks depending on a particular Service Member's role and individual training needs. This training is unique in DoD in that it is: hands on, simulates real tasks typically conducted on ordinary exercises, and can provide leadership opportunities for Junior Officers and Enlisted personnel within a Joint Environment.
