In-Facility Training Opportunities

What do community fairgrounds, a school gymnasium, and a vast parking lot have in common? All are archetypal IRT mission sites. Yet, this is not always the case. Some missions offer in-facility training. This type of operation brings Service Members into a community partner's building to utilize the equipment inside to accomplish training objectives. This month, we highlight two FY 2021 missions fitting this model.

A recurring IRT partnership with the Indian Health Service, this year's Operation Walking Shield in Belcourt, North Dakota, delivered military training while supplying medical care across multiple medical specialties. Led by the Army Reserve and supported by the Active Duty Army, Service Members trained

inside the Quentin N. Burdick Memorial Health Care Facility from May 1 to 15. This space simulated real-world conditions when circumstances require commandeering a hospital to address mass casualty scenarios. Thankfully, this was solely a training exercise, but it enabled peoples of the Turtle Mountain Band of Chippewa to receive no-cost access to general medicine, oral exams, and optometry services.

We also highlight Idaho Cyber—a mission lasting from April 1 to September 30 in partnership between the Army National Guard and the Idaho Office of the Governor. A niche team of 12 Soldiers are working with the Information Technology (IT) Services division of Idaho to find and mitigate critical risks that support core government business functions on-premises as well as in the cloud. A newer mission type in the IRT portfolio, cybersecurity (cyber) mission training assists our Service Members with facing new and emerging threats in the cyber domain. In addition to training on software platforms, cyber missions offer in-facility opportunities for Service Members to enter IT installation sites to assess hardware infrastructure.

Whether in-facility or not, all IRT mission sites furnish the space to facilitate valuable training exercises. Site surveys before or during the mission planning meetings address suitability of locations proposed by the community partner. Refer to our February 2021 newsletter to learn more about mission planning meetings.
