Marine Corps Training Value in Texas Mission

From June 10 - 24, the United States Marine Corps Reserve (USMCR) led the Nueces County Emergency Staging Area Improvements mission in partnership with the County of Nueces in Robstown, Texas. The local community uses the Richard M. Borchard Regional Fairgrounds as a staging area during emergencies. However, this facility is prone to flooding. The civil engineering mission repaired and improved gravel roads throughout the county, which improved accessibility to the facility and facilitated proper rainwater drainage to prevent future flooding.



Heavy equipment operation, logistics, and mission planning were just a few of the training opportunities the FY22 civil-military partnership with Nueces County provided.

Marines in the Logistical Support Company CLR-45 trained in multiple civil-engineering and construction occupational specialties, including heavy equipment operation, cost estimation, and logistics. These efforts were comprised of rehabilitating the fairgrounds; milling and adding base rock to two miles of roadway; and raising, grading, and compacting an additional three miles of roadway with material removed from the first two roads.

To improve drainage, this mission removed 1,425 cubic yards of material and cleared 10,312 linear feet of ditches. A net total of 4,916 tons of limestone base-materials were added to County Road 22, delivering an estimated \$3,000,000 in benefit to the local community.

The scope of work specific to this mission promoted training activity for the USMCR that would otherwise not be as readily available outside of a deployment environment. It enabled the mission participants to remain technically proficient in all facets of engineering equipment operations that pertain to earth-moving and horizontal construction.
