Airmen return home from IRT to the Vermont Air National Guard Base, South Burlington, Vermont. IRT partnered with the Girl Scouts of Hawai'i to renovate and modernize the 6.7-acre Camp Kilohana on the slopes of Mauna Kea, Hawai'i. The old radio transmission site was given to the Girl Scouts from the U.S. Army over 20 years ago and was in desperate need of repairs that would improve the safety and wellbeing of camp attendees, and increase resilience to wildland fires. The Air National Guard (ANG) led joint this construction project, trained 217 personnel, and provided construction labor at no cost to the community partner.

U.S. soldiers from the 86th Engineer Dive Detachment prepare to jump in the water for a deepwater dive to retrieve derelict fishing nets in the Puget Sound near Blaine as part of IRT's first dive mission. IRT partnered with the Washington Department of Natural Resources to remove these hazards, which were too deep for the community partner to retrieve. This training provided divers with real world experience executing critical tasks, which improved their operational readiness. Junior divers gained experience working at depth while supervisors gained experience in managing complex, high-risk diving operations. Over the course of four weeks, 25 service members received training across nine training categories.

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


Central New Mexico Community College Data Center Operations Director New Mexico Cybershield

Mr. Halverson was recognized for his selfless devotion of personal time, commitment, and support for the IRT program, coordinating local, regional, state, and tribal entities to ensure seamless readiness training to Native American communities. His efforts, with the support of 57 military personnel, enabled \$250,000 in local critical infrastructure penetration testing and provided training for 41 Central New Mexico and tribal students.





IRT Mission: Kaua'i County Emergency Operations Plan Revision and Refuge Assessment Survey

Fall 2023 | Līhu'e, Kaua'i, Hawai'i

From 22 May to 30 September 2023, the Air National Guard partnered with the Kaua'i Emergency Management Agency (KEMA) to provide no-cost administrative and technical support in updating and publishing the county's Emergency Operations Plan (EOP). This mission established and promoted local, state, and federal framework capabilities to prepare for, mitigate, respond to, and recover from natural emergencies. Over the course of 11 days, 10 service members received real-world emergency management training across 36 Training and Readiness Standards. Airmen trained in Program Review, Emergency Management Planning, and Resource Management. Throughout the training, Airmen drew on critical thinking, emergency management, and collaboration skills to execute IRT's first emergency management mission. While the work was conducted in the town of Lihu'e, the work accomplished will impact the entire Kaua'i community as well as the state of Hawai'i. The mission's success ensures that state and federal disaster resources from FEMA, as well as state agencies, will be available and distributed in an efficient and effective manner.

IRT Mission: Round Valley Indian Health Center—Operation Walking Shield



From 12 to 25 June 2023, the Army Reserve partnered with the Round Valley Indian Health Center to deliver no-cost medical services to the Round Valley Indian community which lacked access to basic healthcare services. Supported by the Marine Corps Reserve, Navy Reserve, and Air National Guard, service members provided medical, dental, optometry, and veterinary services, which accomplished real-world unit and individual readiness training. Service members trained in medical services, logistics, communications, public affairs, and leadership across multiple operational sites. During the nineday mission, 547 patients received care and 1,213 procedures were performed, including adult and pediatric primary wellness exams, lab tests, x-rays, tooth fillings, and extractions. Additionally, 133 veterinary procedures were carried out including spaying, neutering, deworming, and rabies vaccinations.

IRT Mission: Camp Kamassa

Summer 2023 | Crystal Springs, Mississippi



From 20 May to 25 July 2023, the Army National Guard (ARNG) partnered with the Mississippi's Toughest Kids Foundation (MTK) to provide nocost construction assistance for Camp Kamassa. During this mission 607 service members completed 26,000 hours of training across 19 training categories including carpentry, maintenance, transportation, project management, and heavy equipment operation. Service members constructed family cabins, 1,500 feet of access road, a 1,000-foot drainage ditch, and delivered over 4,000 cubic yards of gravel to the camp. Custom showers, 15 switch boxes, and 74 light boxes were also installed. The estimated value of the construction support, including labor and equipment, exceeded \$1.2 million.

IRT has been proud to partner with MTK since 2018. The camp's future goals include a lake for canoeing and fishing, an equestrian center, a rope course, rock-climbing wall, and more.

IRT Mission: New Mexico Cybershield

Summer 2023 | Albuquerque, Mescalero, Acoma, New Mexico

From 10 to 21 July 2023, the Air Force Reserve Command led the largest IRT cybersecurity mission to date, partnering with Central New Mexico Community College, Luna Community College, and Indian Pueblo Cultural Center for the New Mexico Cybershield mission. Supported by the Marine Corps Reserve and Air National Guard, the mission delivered no-cost cybersecurity training to tribal, community, and military students. Service members worked to improve the capabilities and security posture of central New Mexico, state government, national labs, utilities, and tribal communities. Over 11 days, IRT delivered 80 cybersecurity training hours and a curriculum including "Intro to Cybersecurity," "Attack Vectors," and "Threat Hunting." Service members, industry experts, and civilian organizers conducted over 200 network penetration tests and compiled tailored, in-depth network threat and vulnerability assessment tasks. The mission validated and identified gaps in policies, plans, and procedures and raised cyber threat awareness to the community while service members gained valuable real world cybersecurity training.

IRT Mission: Custer State Park

From 9 July to 6 August 2023, the U.S. Marine Corps Reserve led a joint construction mission in partnership with Custer State Park and the Active Duty U.S. Marine Corps. The mission offered a unique opportunity for participants to train in various engineering tasks including operating engineering equipment for 475 hours, grading 140 miles of road, moving 6,500 cubic feet of earth, installing 2,100 tons of rock, removing 3,000 trees and 9 acres of vegetation, enhancing 10 miles of trails, and constructing 12 water crossings. This mission had a positive impact on park employees and visitors alike while delivering hands-on training for 281 service members. It resulted in safer access to Buffalo Corral Road and improved the safety of the Mickelson Bridge for cyclists, runners, and walkers. The park's trail enhancements allow visitors to access previously unreachable areas, and the newly constructed picnic pavilion provides protection from inclement weather. Tree clearing and land improvements will mitigate forest fires through brush and vegetation fuel removal. This successful collaboration exemplifies how IRT partnerships benefit communities and contribute to unit readiness through real-world mission training.

IRT Civil Military Partnership of the Year is awarded to the Commonwealth Bureau of Military Affairs, in partnership with the Army Reserve, for their success in executing the Operation Healthy CNMI mission on the geographically remote Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands. Due to their tireless efforts and collaboration, this partnership delivered no-cost medical, dental, and veterinary care to the islands resulting in 176 service members trained, 3,972 patients that received medical care, and strengthened relations between the military and local community.

★ 2023 PROGRAM SUMMARY ★



At the conclusion of the FY23 mission season, IRT is proud to have completed 31 years of civil military partnerships, providing real-world training to service members while contributing lasting benefits to American communities. In FY23, OSD provided \$20.3M of funding toward mission completion. Service members from the Army Reserve, Army National Guard, Marine Corps Active Duty, Marine Corps Reserve, Navy Reserve, Air National Guard, and Air Force Reserve led or supported 68 civil-military partnerships that supplied training in medical, dental, and veterinary care as well as diving, land clearing, cybersecurity, transportation, civil affairs, and construction. These missions were conducted across 35 states and territories, including remote and logistically challenging locations, such as Hawai'i, Alaska, the Northern Mariana Islands, and Guam, resulting in 7,190 service members trained.

IRT leadership commends the Total Force and all the Services for their combined dedication, skill sets, and team efforts to ensure mission-ready forces. A special "Thank you" goes to the Program Managers, who, through numerous workshops, have shared their strategies, lessons learned, and other resources to provide support to participants and mission planners.

IRT looks forward to the success of the upcoming FY24 mission portfolio, which projects 53 new and repeat civil-military partnerships missions across 31 states and territories.


