
SSgt Alexia Doe U.S. Marine Corps Exercise Manager and Communication Strategy and Operations Marine (E-1 to E-6)



IRT Mission: Special Olympics of Hawaii IRT

From June 12 to September 24, 2022, the Special Olympics of Hawai'i, Inc. hosted Service Members from the Air Force Reserve Command, Army National Guard, Navy Reserve, and Air National Guard for the Fulfilling a Dream: ... Special Olympics Hawai'i 2022 mission. This joint mission provided no-cost civil engineering support in constructing a multipurpose sports, education, fitness, and wellness community center in Kapolei. Nearly 300 Service Members planned, prepared, and trained in horizontal and vertical construction, electrical and utilities work, preventative maintenance, construction management, heavy equipment operations, and facilities operations services and procedures in a field environment. This mission created accessible, state-of-theart facilities for persons with disabilities that will serve hundreds of Special Olympics athletes. New construction included a multilevel sports training and warehouse building fit with a play court, bathrooms, a fire safe room, and small office facilities. IRT's joint missions foster deep connections between the military and American community members, build awareness, promote inclusivity, and support the health and wellness of communities for future generations.

IRT Mission: Valley Healthcare

From August 1 to August 15, 2022, Service Members from the Air National Guard, Army Reserve, Navy Reserve, and Active Duty Air Force partnered with Valley Healthcare System, Inc. for the Valley Healthcare mission to provide no-cost medical, dental, vision, and veterinary services to populations in west central Georgia and east central Alabama. The mission accomplished unit and individual readiness training for military professionals at multiple operation sites for real-world medical services, logistics, communications, public affairs, and leadership. During the 15-day mission, 10,989 procedures were performed on 2,029 patients, including primary wellness checks, behavioral health evaluations, physical therapy, medication application, dental health checks, optometry checks, and nocost eyeglasses, which greatly benefited residents who lacked access to basic healthcare services. In addition, 650 animals received veterinary check-ups and vaccinations. IRT's joint missions continue to foster awareness of health needs and support the wellness of American communities.

Summer 2022 | New Mexico



From May 1 to June 29, 2022, the Southwest Indian Foundation hosted Service Members from the Navy Reserve and Army Reserve for the Operation Footprint mission to provide nocost commercial and residential construction for the local Navajo, Zuni, and Hopi reservations. This mission provided an excellent venue to plan, prepare, and train on executing tasks in vertical construction, preventative maintenance, construction management, and facilities operations services and procedures in a field environment. Service Members constructed two houses for low-income, disabled, and elderly Native families; a concrete pad for a barn to cultivate, grow, and harvest produce during the summer months; and three foundations and concrete pads that will be used to build religious monuments. All participants enhanced their skills, developed connections that will carry forward into future missions, and fostered relationships between Service Members and the Native communities of New Mexico.

From June 6 to July 1, 2022, the Wayne National Forest hosted Service Members from the Army National Guard and Active Duty Marine Corps for the Wayne National Forest mission to perform horizontal construction along roads to limit soil erosion and provide safe transport facilities to the local community. The mission supplied an excellent venue to plan, prepare, and train on executing tasks such as performing heavy equipment handling, site preparation, and retrograde operation services and procedures in a field environment. This mission addressed the needs of the local community by repairing two national forest roads and conducting culvert replacement, grading, ditching, spot surfacing, garbage dump clean-up, and tire collection. All participants enhanced their skills, developed connections that will carry forward into future missions, and fostered relationships between Service Members and the local community.

IRT Mission: Cyber Tatanka

From June 17 to July 1, 2022, the Army National Guard and Air Force Reserve Command partnered with Nebraska Public Power District for the Cyber Tatanka mission to assess the effectiveness of the local organizational network defense across multiple areas of critical information technology infrastructure. The mission provided an excellent venue to plan, prepare, and train on exercising policies and procedures as well as directing command and control functions in a field environment. This mission improved participants' understanding of and capabilities with using open-source frameworks and methods, reacting to cybersecurity incidents of varying complexity levels, and reinforcing incident response best practices, which addressed the security needs of the Nebraska Emergency Management Department and the State of Nebraska. This mission built interagency and public-private sector relationships for sharing capabilities and information.





At the conclusion of the FY 2022 mission season, IRT is proud to have completed 30 years of civil-military partnerships, which entail providing real-world training to Service Members while contributing lasting benefits to American communities. In FY 2022, OSD provided \$10.4M of funding toward the completion of the missions. Service Members from the Army Reserve, Army National Guard, Marine Corps Active Duty, Marine Corps Reserve, Navy Reserve, Air National Guard, and Air Force Reserve led or supported 59 civil-military partnerships that supplied training in medical, dental, and veterinary care as well as demolition, land clearing, cybersecurity, aerial spray, transportation, civil affairs, and construction. These missions were conducted across 31 states and territories, including remote and logistically challenging locations, such as Hawai'i, Alaska, and Saipan, and resulted in 6,525 Service Members trained.

IRT leadership commends the Joint Services and their combined dedication, skill sets, and team efforts to ensuring mission-ready forces. A special "Thank you" goes to the Program Managers, who, through numerous workshops, have shared their strategies, lessons learned, and other resources to provide support to participants and mission planners.

IRT looks forward to the success of the upcoming FY 2023 mission portfolio, which projects 60 new and repeat civil-military partnerships missions across 31 states and territories.
